

OUR PANELISTS

Karin Anderson is a writer whose work is grounded in complex characters and places of the arid American West. Writing for Torrey House Press, she is the author of two novels, *Before Us Like a Land of Dreams* and *What Falls Away*. Also with Torrey House, she co-edited an anthology of essays and poems about evolving commitments to Western environments.

James M. Aton is an award-winning author or co-author of seven books on the Colorado Plateau's rivers, explorers, and artists. He was a professor of English at SUU from 1980 to 2020. He currently serves as the board president of the Colorado Plateau Archaeological Alliance.

Lisa Bickmore is the author of three books of poems; *flicker*, won the 2014 Antivenom Prize. She won the 2015 Ballymaloe International Poetry Prize for the poem "Eidolon." She is the founder/publisher of Lightscatter Press. In July 2022, she was named the Utah poet laureate and in 2023 was awarded an Academy of American Poets fellowship for poets laureate.

Tamra Borchardt-Slayton is the Indian Peaks Band chairperson and tribal council member for the Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah, the family advocate coordinator for the Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah, and an adjunct professor for SUU. She specializes in the Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah's complex history.

Simmons Buntin is the founding editor-in-chief of *Terrain.org* and the author of the forthcoming book *Satellite: Essays of Fatherhood and Home, Near and Far* and a collection of sustainable community care studies, *Unsprawl: Remixing Spaces as Places,* as well as two collections of poetry.

Steve Capone, Jr., hailing from the Rust Belt, is the editor-in-chief of the newly formed indie horror publisher Whisper House Press. Steve is also an award-winning, multi-genre author. Earlier in 2024, he debuted his YA historical/espionage fiction novel *Max in the Capital of Spies: A Max Fredericks Story.*

Rob Carney is the author of nine books of poems, most recently *The Book of Drought* and *Call and Response*. He is a recipient of the XJ Kennedy Prize in Poetry, the Milton Kessler Memorial Prize, and the Robinson Jeffers/Tor House Foundation Award for Poetry, and he has written a featured series called "Old Roads, New Stories" for *Terrain.org* for the last nine years.

John DiAntonio is the artistic director of the Tony Award-winning Utah Shakespeare Festival. He worked for twelve years as an actor, director, and playwright based in New York, Los Angeles, and Denver. John has had ten original plays produced, including five that have toured around the Southwest.

Danielle Beazer Dubrasky is a professor of English and creative writing at SUU. She is the author of the full-length poetry collection *Drift Migration*. She also co-edited, with Karin Anderson, the Torrey House Press anthology *Blossom as the Cliffrose: Mormon Legacies and the Beckoning Wild* in 2021.

Scott R. Edgar is a father of five, a poet, an attorney, and the host of the podcast, *The Poet (delayed)*. He published his first book of poetry in June of 2022 and is currently working on his second book, which he anticipates being out this fall. He also loves to saunter through the mountains and deserts of Utah.

Rosalyn Eves is an English professor at SUU and a writer of award-winning young adult novels: a historical fantasy trilogy, *Blood Rose Rebellion*; a historical novel about the American West, *Beyond the Mapped Stars*; and two YA Regency romantic comedies.

Autumn Gillard, a maternal descendant from the Cedar Band of Paiutes of the Paiute Indian Tribe, is the tribe's cultural resource manager. An expert in Southern Paiute astronomy, ethnobotany, and culture, she was raised by her grandmother and mother in a traditional home and currently resides on the Kaibab Paiute Reservation.

Nathan Hale is the author and illustrator of the Eisner-nominated, New York Times bestselling graphic novel series on American history *Nathan Hale's Hazardous Tales*. He also created the sci-fi horror comics *ONE TRICK PONY* and *APOCALYPSE TACO*. He is the illustrator of the graphic novel *RAPUNZEL'S REVENGE* and its sequel, *CALAMITY JACK*, among others.

Kase Johnstun lives and writes in Ogden, Utah. He is the author of the novel *CAST AWAY* from Torrey House Press and *Let the Wild Grasses Grow*. His book *Beyond the Grip Craniosynostosis* was awarded the Gold Quill in Creative Nonfiction by the League of Utah Writers for 2015. His work has also been published widely by literary journals and trade magazines.

Evan Y. Jones was born and raised in Cedar City, Utah. He is a licensed professional engineer and has spent his entire career in mining, which began in 1967 working at the iron mines west of Cedar City. He also worked in Australia, New Mexico, Los Angeles, Denver, and Gillette, Wyoming.

Ken Lamug is an author-illustrator who has created award-winning picture books and graphic novels. He has created novelty parodies like *Hurts Like A Mother, A is for*

Asteroids Z is for Zombies, and the spooky The Stumps of Flattop Hill. He also loves creating stories for the younger audience. Lamug's latest book is the Mischief and Mayhem graphic series.

Craig Lancaster is a novelist and playwright who lives in Billings, Montana. He is the author of 10 novels, including his most recent, *Northward Dreams*. His work, largely set in the contemporary American West, has won two High Plains Book Awards among many others. His first full-length play, *Straight On To Stardust*, received a world premiere staging by Yellowstone Repertory Theatre in 2023.

C.R. (Sylvia) Langille spent many a Saturday afternoon watching monster movies with her mom. It wasn't long before she started crafting nightmares to share with her readers. She is a retired, disabled veteran with a deep love for weird and creepy tales. This prompted her to form Timber Ghost Press in January of 2021.

Julia Lyon used to interview kids around the world as a newspaper reporter. Now she writes books for them! She is the Utah-based author of *A Dinosaur Named Ruth*. A former journalist for daily newspapers in Oregon and Utah, Julia received a United Nations Correspondents Association gold medal after visiting and reporting on refugee camps in Thailand and the families that came to Utah.

L. E. Modesitt, Jr., is the author of 85 science fiction and fantasy novels and nearly 50 short stories, as well as assorted nonfiction and political/economic commentary. His five fantasy series include the *Recluce Saga*, the *Imager Portfolio*, and the *Grand Illusion*.

David G. Pace, a Provo native, is the author of the debut novel *Dream House on Golan Drive* and a collection, *American Trinity and Other Stories from the Mormon Corridor.* As a journalist, his byline has appeared in *The Christian Science Monitor, American Theatre, Huffington Post,* and many local/regional newspapers and magazines.

Daria Peoples' first job was at nine years old in the children's section of her hometown library in Paso Robles, California. She worked a little, but she mostly read picture books. After earning a master's in education and 10 years of teaching, she became a full-time author and illustrator.

Alisa Petersen is the Beverley Taylor Sorenson endowed chair of elementary art education at SUU. She is the director of the artsFUSION outreach program, and she holds degrees in fine art and education and teaches courses in arts integration and creativity in early childhood.

Todd Robert Petersen lives in Cedar City, Utah, with his wife and three children. He is a professor of English at SUU, where he teaches creative writing and film studies courses. *Picnic in the Ruins*, a dark comedy about antiquities theft set on the Utah/Arizona border, came out in 2021.

Zoë Petersen is an illustrator living in southern Utah. Her work has been awarded by the Utah Society of Professional Journalists and 3x3 Magazine. Since 2021, she has been employed as an editorial illustrator. Her art has appeared in Deseret News, Gumption, and Short Story, Long.

Micah Player is an author and illustrator of books and games. His first picture book, *Chloe, Instead,* was published by Chronicle Books in 2012. Rich digital color, washy textures, sharp midcentury inspired shapes, and expressive ink lettering define his style. He and his family live in a little house beneath a big tree in Cedar City, Utah.

Jonathan Reddoch is a co-owner of Collective Tales Publishing. He is a father, writer, editor, and publisher. He writes sci-fi, fantasy, romance, and especially horror. He's a prolific flash fiction author but also writes poetry and short stories. He has been working on his enormous sci-fi novel for over a decade and would like to finish it in this lifetime if possible.

Paisley Rekdal, a former Utah poet laureate, is the author of four books of nonfiction and seven books of poetry, including *Nightingale, Appropriate: A Provocation,* and, most recently, *West: A Translation.* She is the editor and creator of the digital archive projects West, Mapping Literary Utah, and Mapping Salt Lake City.

Emily Ronquillo is exploring her artistry through printmaking, collage, and zines. She draws inspiration from pop culture, traveling, and her identity as a biracial queer woman. Emily enjoys creating spaces and accessibly for other people to explore their artistry, most notably through hosting collage parties and zine workshops.

Janet Burton Seegmiller's publications include an award-winning biography, The Life Story of Robert Taylor Burton, and the 1998 History of Iron County, Community above Self. While at SUU, she and Ryan Paul collaborated on gathering oral histories, photographs, and park history, and in 2020 published Singaway, Working and Playing for the Utah Parks Company, 1923-1972.

Stewart Shelley is currently the education director for the Utah Shakespeare Festival. He spent fourteen wonderful years as a high school theatre teacher before making a big move with his family to the island of St. Croix. While he misses the ocean, he is delighted to be back in Utah and part of such an incredible institution for theatre and education.

Whitney Staheli is an artist local to southern Utah working in a range of media, including printmaking and zine making. The themes behind her zines have primarily focused on music, personal growth, and mental health. Her visual art has been featured in local publications such as *Kolob Canyon Review*, and she has exhibited in group shows at SUMA.

Elizabeth Suggs is the founder of the LUW Romance Writers Chapter, co-owner of the indie publisher Collective Tales Publishing, owner of Editing Mee, and the author of a growing number of award-winning published stories.

Nano Taggart is a founding editor of *Sugar House Review* and serves as faculty advisor for SUU's literary magazine, *Kolob Canyon Review*. You can see some of his writing in places like the *Laurel Review*, *Verse Daily*, *Terrain.org*, *The Shore Poetry*, and elsewhere.

Jessica Tvordi's debut indie novel, *The Schoolmaster*, transports readers to the court of King James VI of Scotland. Jessica is an associate professor of English at SUU, where she teaches courses in Shakespeare and early British women writers and co-organizes the Wooden O Symposium.

E.B. (Elaine) Vickers is an award-winning author of picture books as well as middle grade and young adult novels that aim to help readers of all ages find connection and belonging. She grew up in southern Utah, where she spent her time reading, playing basketball, and exploring. Several years and one PhD later, she found her way back to her hometown, where she now spends her time writing, teaching college chemistry, and exploring with her family.

Julie Wright has written 28 novels and is a two-time Whitney Award winner, a Teen Readers' Choice Award Nominee, and a Kansas National Education Association's Reading Circle Commission Nominee. Her books have received several starred reviews and have been listed in the American Library Association's top ten romances of the year.

Natalie Padilla Young co-founded and manages the poetry magazine Sugar House Review. Her first book, All of This Was Once Under Water, is out from Quarter Press. Natalie's poetry has appeared in Green Mountains Review, Tampa Review, Rattle, South Dakota Review, Los Angeles Times, Tar River Poetry, Terrain.org, and elsewhere. She serves on the Utah Arts Advisory and Lightscatter Press boards.
